

JAMES M. CAIN

was born in Annapolis, Maryland, July 1, 1892. When he was eleven years old his father was chosen president of Washington College, where Cain later matriculated and from which he was graduated in 1910. He served for a year in the A.E.F., and for five years worked for the Baltimore Sun. He was an editorial writer for the New York World from 1924 until it was sold, when he went to California, where he now lives, working for the movies and writing for magazines and newspapers.

Mr. Cain is the author of an early book, *Our Government*, and of numerous articles, sketches, and short-stories which have attracted more than usual attention and provoked more than usual discussion.

Not in a long has anybody come along so breathtaking as James M. Cain — a man with a story all his own, a style all his own, and the speed and violence and energy of dynamite. What ever you may think of this book, it has the one great quality — you cannot put it down. From the moment the young bum comes of the hot-dog stand and meets the Greek proprietor's wife and they fall like bricks for each other, the story rushes, plunges ahead — clandestine love affair, first fail, to kell the Greek which fails, second plot which succeeds, dissimulation, arrest, trial for murder — but that's only the beginning of the story, not the climax.

This book is like a ride on a roller-coaster. Yet for all its thrills, it is not an old-style thriller. It is a hard-boiled realistic narrative about two hard-boiled realistic people, bound together by sex and greed, and it is put before the read in clipped and biting prose.

This book will not appear in a cheaper edition before the spring of 1935. Whether it does so appear at that time or later will depend on how large a sale it enjoys during the first year it is on sale. Usually it is possible to producer cheap editions only of those books that sell widely at the original sale price.
